Day 01 USA – Beijing

Depart from Los Angeles, New York, or any other major US gateways. Enjoy in-flight meals and services. Move your watch one day ahead as you fly cross the international dateline.

Day 02 Arrive in Beijing

Your flight will land in Beijing Capital International Airport. After immigration and customs, VIP private transfer service will greet and take you to the 5 star, luxurious, *Beijing International Hotel* with prime downtown location.

Day 03 Beijing

Welcome to Beijing, China's capital and political heartland. The city gained its prominence as a winter capital during the Yuan dynasty under the



Mongol Emperor **Kublai Khan** in late 13th century. Our program today begins at the magnificent Forbidden City, also called "Da Nei" in the last dynasty,

meaning "The Great Within". The massive 9,999 rooms compound served as the royal

residence of the imperial family for over 500 years. 24 Emperors from the Ming and Qing Dynasties called here home. It is now the largest and best preserved imperial palace museum in the world. Today we will marvel at the



architectural splendor of the grand palaces and halls, beautiful ceremonial courtyards, as well as exquisite private quarters. In its heyday there were 8,000 - 10,000 people lived here, including

3,000 eunuchs, and maids and concubines. Its formidable 30 ft high walls are surrounded by a massive 160 ft broad



moat. Life behind its colossal palace gates was once dictated by complex rules and rituals, and was strictly out of boundary for commoners. Now these very same gates will lead us to a



fascinating display of the best preserved classical Chinese architecture at pinnacle. Next, we walk through the Gate of the Heavenly Peace under the massive portrait of Chairman Mao, and enter the Tiananmen Square, the largest

public plaza in the world that can hold a million people. We will stroll across its vast expanse and take pictures at the Great Hall of the People - home of the National People's Congress, Chairman Mao's' Mausoleum, Monument to the People's Heroes, as well as other surrounding historical buildings, monuments and museums. In early afternoon we will take a Rickshaw ride through old Beijing's atmospheric Hutongs, a network of centuries old courtyard homes and narrow lanes that once pervaded the traditional city. Used to be the center of life for its citizens, they are now



disappearing fast to leave way for the modern development of high rises, department stores and highways. We will discover the mazz like alleyways - some are so narrow that only one person can walk by at a time, and observe the locals go about their daily life. Initially each Hutong was its own community with unique history. The courtyard home along the lane are called "Si He Yuan", literarily means "Four Combined Courtyard", offering generous and functional space for four or more generation living under one roof, reflecting the Confucius idea of the perfect harmonious family value. Through Orient Odyssey's unique "People to People Contact©", we will njoy our lunch in an old courtyard home, prepared and cooked by the family members, who we can take the opportunity to mingle and interact with. The clash of new and old are apparent: with the capital's rapid development, Hutong, along with the centuries old life styles are disappearing fast. Left behind are mostly seniors or those who treasure the traditional way of life and determine



to preserve it at all cost. The rickshaw ride ends at the ancient Dum Tower where we can climb to the top and enjoy a

birds-eye view of the capital. On route back to the hotel, we will take a picture-stop at the famous 2008 Beijing Olympic Venues: The Bird Nest and the Water Cube. B/SL/D

Day 04 Beijing

This morning we take a scenic drive through the countryside to the most famous monument in China - the Great Wall. Orient Odyssey is proud to feature the less visited, but more spectacular (and more expensive too) Mutianyu Section, reputably the best preserved part of the wall. The original wall was built in the 5th century BC to exclude foreign invaders. After centuries' construction, the walls of the former independent kingdoms were eventually linked up. Stretching over a distance of 3,500 miles. The Wall starts at the Yellow Sea at its west end, ends in the Gobi



Desert in the east. Today we enjoy ample time to walk the wall at our own pace – we highly recommend the optional cable car ride to reach the wall at the mountain top for best birds' eye views, taking in the enormity of this edifice. We will enjoy the breathtaking view of the mighty

wall climbing and descending along with the verdant mountain landscape. Let us also venture into couple of the formidable watch towers, few of them



have been restored and more are in ruins. On route back to the city, we may make a stop at a cloisonné factory to observe the painstaking labor intensive procedures to create some unbelievable art pieces. Late afternoon we reach the idyllic imperial Summer Palace - the "Garden of Cultivated Harmony" built by Empress Dowager Tsu Hsi, using the state budget initially intended for the creation of a naval fleet. The beautiful resort, with its temples, lakes and pavilions, was designed to copy the best gardens and sceneries all over China. We enjoy a leisurely stroll in the Long Corridor,

heavily decorated with exquisite Chinese paintings at every corner depicting the scenes from 5,000 years of Chinese mythology and



famous historic events. The 2,572 ft covered pathway runs parallel to the Northern shore of the picturesque Kunming Lake, ended at a lavish

marble boat adorned with European style glasses, said to be one of **Tsu Hsi**'s favorite spot for afternoon tea. Tonight's multi-plate welcome dinner features the famous



<u>delicious local flavor dish of Peking Duck</u>, roasted to the crispy perfection. Red wine is on us! B/L/SD

Day 05 Beijing – Bullet Train – Jinan

After breakfast, we board the *high speed bullet train G13*, leaving Beijing at 10:00 a.m.. Enjoy the smooth scenic ride through the vast Northern China Plain, sometimes reaching the amazing speed of around 240 mph! High speed rail



service was just introduced to China in 2007. By now China already has the world's largest high speed rail network. Shortly before our arrival in Jinan at 11:32 a.m., our train will zip cross the bridge over the Yellow River. The guide will greet and escort us to the 5 star, luxurious, *Shandong Hotel*. The area of the present-day Jinan has played an important role from the beginnings of the Chinese civilization. Its name literally means "*South of the Ji* (waters)",

referring to the old Ji River that had flowed to the north of the city until the middle of the 19th century when the Yellow River changed its course northwards and took over its bed. We will start today's sightseeing at the dyke of the Yellow River, the second longest in China after Yangtze and the sixth longest in the world, estimated at 3,395 miles. It is frequently regarded as "the cradle of Chinese civilization" as its basin was the birth place of Chinese civilization and the most prosperous region in early Chinese history. In recent years, the continual elevation of river bed – in some areas Yellow River is running above the level of its surrounding fields – has caused numerous devastating floods that killed millions. Jinan is also referred to as "City of Springs", because of the many spring wells that bubble up within the city limits, specially known for their supreme



water quality and clear sweet taste. Today we will visit one of the largest spring - the Black Tiger Spring, where the water sounds like the roar of a

tiger gurgling out through three carved tiger heads into the green city moat. Tonight we feast on a special multi course banquet of Shandong Cuisine, one of the most influential in Chinese cooking styles. As an exclusively feature of Orient Odyssey's program, we will visit the kitchen and interact with the master chef to learn some behind the scene "secrets" of the culinary delights. After dinner, through Orient Odyssey's unique "People to People Contacto" we head to Quancheng "Spring City" Square, and mingle with locals – this is the local residents' most favorite spot for exercises,



dancing, Taichi practicing, or simply spending time with children or grand children. Feel free to join them or simply observe. B/L/SD

Day 06 Jinan - Buyang Village - Tai An

In the morning we set out for a smooth scenic drive. Take in sceneries of vast Northern China plain, wheat, potato and vegetable fields, passing villages, small towns and markets. Enjoy Orient Odyssey's "People to People Contact®" we will stop at Buyang Village, an unspoiled, dusty

Chinese village at foot of the Mt. Tai. Enjoy the opportunity to have a close look at the authentic Chinese rural life. We will visit a farmer's home and have dumpling lunch and mingle with the household members. Learn how to make dumplings and assist the family to cook. We will also visit a village Kindergarten and a nursing home, enjoy interaction with teachers, children, and seniors. It is a rare opportunity to obtain the authentic insights of the daily about in



the Chinese village. We then continue our journey to the beautiful Dai Temple, the temple of the God of Mt. Tai. It is the largest and the most complete ancient building complex in the area. Built in Han Dynasty (206 BC – 220 AD), it covers 24 acres. Its design has been a replica of the imperial palace, which makes it one out of the three extant structures in China with the features of the imperial palace (the other two are the Forbidden City in Beijing, and the Confucius' Temple in Qufu). Throughout the Chinese history, it is where emperors held lavish ceremonies, made sacrifices to the God of the Heaven and Earth, and worshiped the God of Mt. Tai. We will stroll through five major halls. The most significant is the Palace of Heavenly Blessings built in 1008 AD, which houses a 13 ft tall shrine of Mountain God and the magnificent 10 ft high 203 ft long ancient mural dating back



to the same time period. In the backyard, we will also marvel at the Yaocan Pavillion with its ancient archway, and the exquisite Bronze

Pavilion (dating back to 1672 AD), and its iron tower, iron lions, and Double Dragon Pool, The temple ground is surrounded by Han Dynasty Courtyards, where we can find some 2,100 years old Cypress. Tonight we check-in at the 5 star, luxurious, *Ramada Plaza Tai'an*, one of the newest luxury properties in town. B/L/D

Day 07 Mt. Tai – Qufu

After breakfast we will explore China's most sacred mountain, the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Mt. Tai. We first drive to the midway through a scenic gradual ascend, and then take a spectacular cable car ride to the summit – the Jade Emperor Peak at 5,069 ft. Mt. Tai, associated with sunrise, birth and renewal, is regarded as the most sacred of the "Five Greatest Mountains" in China. For over 3,000 years it has been a place of worship, and overtime, this worship evolved into an official imperial rite. Hence Mt. Tai became the most important



ceremonial grounds where almost every emperor throughout the Chinese history would pay homage to heaven (on the summit) and earth (at the foot of the mountain). Chinese emperors consider themselves as the "mandate from heaven", while they regard Mt. Tai as the emperor of all mountains. Through highly ritualized ceremonies, emperors would travel here to make sacrifices of food, jade and various other ritualistic items, which would then be



arranged in a ritually correct pattern before being buried on mountain. the The cable car ride (or take advantage of 7,200 about ancient steps if you wish) will

take us to the summit, where we will take time to stroll on the "Street in Heaven", teaming with ancient temple complexes, numerous vendors and restaurants (all their supplies must be carried up by porters on foot from the bottom of the mountain), and quiet stone pathways. We will explore Jade Emperor Temple, Qingdi Palace, Dou Mu Hall, numerous ancient cliff side

inscriptions and stone tablets left by poets, literary scholars and emperors throughout the history. One of the most famous one says "Most



Revered of Five Sacred Mountains". The other one marked "Lu Viewing Platform", from which Confucius once stood to enjoy a birds' eye view of his home state below, and expressed in awe "the world is small". Early afternoon we head to Qufu, the quiet Confucius' hometown via a scenic drive. Check-in at the 5 star, luxurious, Shangri-la Hotel Qufu, the newest and the most luxury property in the area. Oufu is the hometown of Confucius, who is believed to have been born at the nearby Mt. Ni. Upon arrival, we will explore the Cemetery of Confucius, "Kong Lin" as it is called in Chinese. Some of the oldest graves found in this location date back to the Zhou Dynasty (1046 - 256 BC). We will take a look at Confucius' Tomb, erected in later days in a cone-shaped hill, surrounded by tombs



of his descendants (in the number of around 100,000 over a period of 2,000 years), many of whom were honored with noble titles and given imperial princesses as wives. The most recent tombs belong to the descendants in the 76th and 78th generation. In November, 1966, during the


Cultural Revolution, university students from Beijing came to Qufu and destroyed more than 6,000 artifacts. The corpse of the Duke of Qufu – the 76th generation of **Confucius**' family, was removed from his grave and hung naked from a tree in front of the palace. Today, this UNESCO World Heritage Site has been restored to formal glory, and is surrounded by more than 10,000 mature trees with a serene forests-like appearance. B/L/D

Day 08 Qufu – Suzhou




The philosophy of **Confucius** (551 – 479 BC) was endorsed by most of the imperial dynasties throughout the Chinese history. It emphasized personal and governmental morality, correctness

of social relationships, justice and sincerity. The principles of Confucianism – strong family royalty, ancestor worship, and respect of elders – became the base of common Chinese tradition and belief. From Han (206 BC – 220 AD) and Tang (618 – 907 AD) Dynasty, Confucianism gained widespread prominence. The works of Confucius were made the official imperial philosophy and required reading for civil service examinations from 140 BC, consistently, without hardly any interruptions, all the way till the end of the 19th century. Today we will explore the



grand, magnificent Confucius' Temple, "Kong Miao". Within two years after Confucius' death, his former house was already consecrated as a temple by the Prince form Lu Kingdom. In 205 BC, the Emperor of the Han Dynasty came to Qufu to offer sacrifices to the memory of Confucius, setting an example for many Emperors and high officials to follow in the next two thousand years. As a result, total 12 different Emperors paid 20 personal visits here, and about 100 others sent their deputies for 196

official visits, mostly after their enthronement or on important occasions such as a successful war. Today the sprawling complex covers 4 square acres with 460 rooms. It is modeled after the Forbidden City in Beijing, with 9 courtyards on a central axis. We will stroll under the grand Lingxing Gate with yellow roof tiles (a feature exclusively reserved for the emperor) and redpainted walls, to the Stele Pavillions, Kuiwen Hall, and the De Mu Tian Di Arch. Then we



will reach the magnificent Dacheng Hall - "the Hall of Grand Perfection", supported by 28 beautifully carved pillars, each 20 ft high, and 2.7 ft in diameter, all carved from entire pieces of local rock. They are adorned with coiled dragons that are so spectacular, that they have to be covered during visits by the Emperor in order not to arouse his envy. The hall is served as the principal place for offering sacrifices to the memory of Confucius. In front is the courtyard where the Apricot Platform stands. commemorates the story that Confucius' gave lessons to his disciples under an apricot tree. Now a yearly grand ceremony is held here to commemorate Confucius' birthday on Sep 28. Our next stop is the family mansion of Confucius, "Kong Fu", an incredible home complex of 152 buildings, 480 rooms, covering an area of 134,200 sq ft. The mansion was inhabited by descendants of Confucius (they once controlled



the largest private rural estate in China) until 1937, when the 76th and 77th generation of the **Confucius** fled to Chongqing during the Second Sino – Japanese War (WWII), and later to Taiwan during the Chinese Civil War. The layout of the mansion is traditionally Chinese. Official rooms are in the front, and residential quarters are in the rear. The distribution of the buildings is according to the seniority, gender, and status of their inhabitants, reflecting the Confucian principle of order and hierarchy. For example, the most senior descendant of Confucius always took up residence in the center of the three main buildings, while his siblings

occupied the halls to the east. This afternoon, we board *high speed bullet train G135*, leaving at 3:21 p.m., passing verdant rice



fields, villages, small towns and markets of Eastern China, reaching Suzhou, often referred to as "Venice of the Orient" at 6:24 p.m.. The guide will greet and escort us to the 5 star, deluxe, Nanlin Hotel. The remaining of the day is free to rest or explore at our own pace. The hotel is centrally located in the city center. Within a short stroll one can reach the zigzag canals, the old cobble stone path dotted with serene ancient gardens, and the bustling city center with famous restaurants and countless shops.

Day 09 Suzhou/Tong-li Excursion – Shanghai Welcome to Suzhou, a 2,500 year old city and a UNESCO World Heritage Site, renowned for her traditional gardens, ancient canals and silk



production. of the Grand Canal began 1,500 years ago for transporting goods to the northern capital of Beijing, over 600 miles away. With prosperity came prestige. As merchants and artisans plied their trades, elaborate gardens were built. Today we will explore the Master

Fisherman's Net Garden dating back to 1,140 AD, intricately designed with changing scenes at each turns, considered by many one of the finest example of China's antique gardens. During our comfortably paced stroll, we will see pavilions, rockeries, fountains, pagodas, ancient trees and precious flowers. The principle of the Chinese garden construction: creating an illusion of the



universe in a small space, is clearly evident here. Our next stop is the silk spinning mill, where we will learn how silk

is created from the mulberry munching silk worms to thread producing and to cloth weaving. Marco Polo once reported that so much precious silk was produced in Suzhou that every citizen was clothed in it. We also visit the National Embroidery Institute, where artists present the amazing double side embroidery, frequently used as state gifts to world leaders. After lunch we board a wooden sampan to cruise the narrow canal water ways and take in the water side floating communities, beautiful bridges, and bustling river traffic. A short drive will take us Tong-li, a small ancient canal town that has retained much of its original architecture and charm. Visit a courtyard mansion and peek into the lavish life style of its past residents; learn about the traditional Chinese wedding customs at a local folklore museum. We will have some free time to stroll on the narrow old cobble stone street, enjoying views of white washed homes,



stone bridges, browsing the Ming style storefronts selling local specialties. In the evening we will take a scenic coach ride to Shanghai, and check-in at the 5 star, luxurious, newly renovated, *Ocean Hotel Shanghai*. B/L/D

Day 10 Shanghai

Shanghai was once called the "Paris and New York of the East". As one of the earliest Chinese ports opened for foreign commerce and residence by the Treaty of Nanking in 1842, it was forced to set aside British, French, American and later international "Concessions", or settlements, in which, foreign residents were given immunity from the Chinese laws. Along the famed Bund, neo-classic high rise bank buildings dominated the skyline, while luxury villas and tree lined boulevards as well as other various European architectural styles boomed in different parts of the city. The high society



enjoyed the luxury accommodation at the art deco style Park Hotel, Asia's tallest building until 1952; danced with the famed jazz band at the Sassoon House.

the most prestigious address in the Far East; bet in the horse race at Shanghai Race Club – the first race track in the country; and drink gin and tonics at the Shanghai Club, home of the world's longest bar. At WWII Shanghai became the safe haven for Jewish Refugees during the holocaust. As an open city, and one of the few places in the world that did not require a visa to enter, nearly 20,000 Jews found shelter here during 1930s to 40s. The taking over in 1949 by the Chinese Marxist-Leninist-Maoists, and decades' of revolutionary movements that followed, had turned the city into a grey, lifeless,

Soviet block type model. From the opening policy in early 80s, with a strong industrial and foreign trade base, the metropolitan



quickly regained its strength. Now it enjoys the full returning glory, if not more, as China's symbol of modernization, as one of the key financial centers in the Far East, and as one of the world's most expensive city to live (in term of real estate). It becomes a tremendously stimulating place to visit and to take a close-up look of the advances, dislocations, and yearnings of today's China. Today we will have a full day to experience the wonders of this bustling cosmopolitan. First, we head to the Bund, the legendary waterfront promenade loomed by the

most impressive skylines in Far East, where locals call "Waitan", meaning the outside beach.



It is indeed a wide eight-lane motorway in front of an impressive collections of old and new tall buildings in various styles — including French,

German and British, from 1920's neoclassic bank buildings fully restored to the original glory, to the shocking 1,614 feet World Financial Center, one of the world's tallest buildings. It is

Collection at Shanghai Museum, one of the best in the world housing numerous priceless artifacts. We also take some time to stroll and take pictures



on the People's Square in front of the museum, surrounded by stunning buildings as the compelling Crystal Palace – the Shanghai Grand Opera House, and the Shanghai Urban Planning Exhibition Hall. The square is also one of



local's favorite hang out for kite flying, ballroom dancing, or folks out for a simple leisurely stroll. The highlight of the day will be Orient Odyssey's unique "People to

People Contact" - <u>a walk on the Nanking Road</u>, reputably the city's (or probably the country's)

most fashionable, and busiest pedestrian-only street, lined up with bars, department stores, entertainment facilities, restaurants (some of Shanghai's best), and shops. There are large world class emporiums and small mom and papa stores. It is a perfect place to see and to be seen, and certainly an ideal place to observe the busy daily life of a Chinese metropolis.
